

Remains of Medieval Soldier found in Lake in Lithuania

On January 13, 2021, the website Vintage News reported that the remains of a medieval solider were found in Lake Asveja in Lithuania. The lake is near Dubingiai Bridge and the near the ruins of Dubingiai Castle. The castle was once important to the defense of medieval Lithuania.

Near the body was found two knives and a sword and he was still wearing the leather boots he died in. Sediment in the lake had kept the body and artifacts well persevered. Although the cause of death has not been determined, it is believed that the solider was employed at the castle.
